Project Summary

The New Jersey Sustainability Reporting Hub - a project of **CivicStory** - meets a growing need for reliable news that clarifies the local actions and practices needed to resolve our climate crises. By generating a critical volume of sustainability news, the NJSR Hub shifts news conversations to include present *and future* generations. Over 100 sustainability news stories are viewable on NJSR Hub -- stories that amplify citizen action to restore healthy ecosystems and help slow and ultimately reverse global atmospheric warming.

Double News Deficit

Current news coverage of sustainability does not match the scale of our global ecological crises. At the same time, New Jersey's highly distributed local governance structure comprising 565 cities and towns presents a challenge for gathering and disseminating local news and information.

Triple Social Benefit

The NJ Sustainability Reporting Hub provides 1) revenue incentives for local news organizations to cover the complex topic of sustainability; 2) career advancement and training for reporting fellows; and 3) essential public information that equips people for contributing to - rather than compromising - the life support systems upon which we all depend. The project leverages existing assets and helps steer existing news resources toward an under-represented but essential area of news reporting.

What We Do

- provide 6-month sustainability reporting fellowships for early to mid-career reporters, hosted by diverse news organizations in New Jersey
- pay reporting stipends of \$4,000 directly to newsrooms, to be allocated as needed
- select fellows through a competitive application and interview process with advice from journalists, science educators, and academic leaders;
- republish multi-media stories, first published by newsrooms, on www.SRHub.org

Reporting Topics

Stories cover key aspects of sustainability: food choice and waste reduction; storm water management; water, soil, and air quality remediation; renewable energy and reducing carbon emissions; transportation and purchasing choice; urban agriculture; green cleaning and natural lawn care; and other factors pertaining to just, thriving communities for future generations.

Press Citations and Reputation

The NJSR Hub project was cited as one of "9 Great Business Ideas for Local News in 2019" in a summary published by the Knight Foundation. The project received an Excellence in Local Journalism - Collaboration award from the Center for Cooperative Media (judged by an independent panel).

Orientation and Training - NJ Presidents Council Resolution


Fellowship orientation sessions have occurred at Montclair State University, Stockton University, and at Rutgers University-Newark. On October 21, 2019, the New Jersey Presidents Council - of higher education leaders - voted unanimously to endorse the NJ Sustainability Reporting Hub project. Resolution - NJ Presidents Council


Response from NJSR Hub Fellows and Editors

Survey responses from editors indicated a high perceived value of the fellowship, with 100% indicating interest in a future NJSR Fellowship. 75% 'strongly' agreed and 25% 'somewhat' agreed that the NJSR Hub Fellowship was beneficial to their newsroom. Editors saw the NJSR fellowship as an opportunity to increase coverage of sustainability and climate change, gain understanding of sustainability action in New Jersey, and increase overall reporting capacity on a cost recovery basis.

Expenditure and Support

Phase 1 of the NJSR Hub project was partially funded by a diverse group of donors, ranging from foundation sponsorship of \$10,000 to small individual donations. CivicStory has received project support from four NJ foundations: New Jersey Health Initiatives (NJHI); Victoria Foundation; Rita Allen Foundation; and The Leavens Foundation. Both the Center for Cooperative Media and Alliance for New Jersey Environmental Education organizations contributed seed funding, and New Jersey Higher Education Partnership for Sustainability assisted with a crowd-sourcing effort.





Career Advancement

NJSR Fellow Brianna Baker, currently reporting for Next City and formerly with Green Philly in Phase 1, begins full-time work in August 2020 as a Climate Solutions Report for **Grist.** She specifically cited her work as a NJ Sustainability Reporting Fellow as having led to this exciting professional opportunity.

TCNJ Partnership - Website Upgrades

Over the 2020 winter-spring semester, 10 combined teams of computer science and journalism students at The College of New Jersey analyzed the SRHub.org and CivicStory websites, and proposed key user enhancements and functionality upgrades. Several proposals are being implemented as part of a revenue and sponsorship strategy.

Growth Phase

Over the past 18 months, CivicStory, a nonprofit 501 (c) (3) news site and the parent company, has focused on building and launching www.SRHub.org. The pilot and second phase fellowships have yielded over 100 news stories - financed by gifts from 113 individuals and small grants from foundations.

The NJ Sustainability Reporting Hub is poised for growth, as follows:

- Increase reporting stipends to \$4,500 to incentivize higher volume and pace of reporting
- Increase participating newsrooms to 8; involve Philadelphia or NYC news entities
- Invest in marketing and communications to increase reach and impact of SR Hub.
- Establish national sustainability news network with Orb Media, Ensia, YaleE360, and other INN members to share networks and content, and to position sustainability news as a matter of broad public interest.

Scaling Sustainability News

The Institute for Nonprofit News (INN) - a robust umbrella organization serving 250 member nonprofit news sites in the US - notes growing interest in sustainability news among funders. Given the newly understood connections between health, sustainability, and racial and social justice due to COVID-19 and the shattering death of George Floyd; the presence "at home" of so many environmentally informed high school and college students in NJ communities; and the urgency of relating human needs to earth's resources, the impacts of sustainability news scaled out from New Jersey will be profound.

2-Year Plan

By July 2022, we project:

- 300+ sustainability news stories on www.SRHub.org searchable by topic and locale
- 16 sustainability news hubs in other states, representing a tipping point of 30% of states
- increased output of sustainability news stories by mainstream news outlets that clarify citizens' key role as earth stewards, choice makers, and change makers
- A Sustainability News Network that shares content and metrics, and optimizes social impact of sustainability news stories locally, regionally, nationally and globally
